The Questionnaire

Part A – A Picture of Our Community – provides the opportunity to gather, explore and present facts and figures about a wide range of facets of parish life.

Part B – *Reflective Questions* – key questions under 10 main headings for open discussion by your parish community, and the opportunity to highlight existing good practice.

Part C – Our Community's Initial Thoughts and Ideas about the Future – where your parish community is asked to provide its first thoughts about how it might move forward.

Ultimately, we would like all parishes to provide their final responses using an on-line questionnaire as this will allow us to collate and analyse responses efficiently – and we will be providing information later in the year about how to do this. However, while drafting and sharing your responses within the parish, you may find that the electronic version of the questionnaire proves to be the best way of recording and storing your responses. Part B - Reflective Questions

When Jesus was walking by the Sea of Galilee and called his first disciples (Mt 4:18), they must not have had a clue what they were getting into. Four fishermen became 'apprentices' to an itinerant leader, teacher and healer, overnight. In Mark's Gospel (Mk 1:21) the first thing they did was to accompany Jesus into the Synagogue in Capernaum, where he proceeded to break the Jewish law by healing a possessed man on the Sabbath.

There is something exciting about being a disciple, an 'apprentice' of Jesus. There is so much to learn and discover. Jesus walked around the countryside with his followers, both women and men; they were a community, a community on the move. The disciples were formed and shaped within this community.

Once Jesus died and rose from the dead, the disciples were terrified. They ran away (to Emmaus) or hid in an upper room or reverted to their previous job – seven of them went back fishing. Time after time Jesus came among them and reassured them. They were totally taken over by the Holy Spirit and began their work as missionaries; they are instructed to go out into the world and proclaim the Gospel.

We live in a very different world today. But as a result of our Baptism, we are called, gifted and sent. We too are sent into the world. We are missionaries within our local population, disciples among all the residents in our neighbourhood.

The local priest looks after the flock. We are immersed in the world; and we engage with each other, with those hurt by the Church, those separated from the Church for whatever reason and those beyond the institution of the Church. Every one of us has a particular pathway of discipleship to follow, and many of us discover it through the communities within which we live.

It is only right that we pray for more men to respond to the call of God to become ordained priests. It is also true that we all need to explore how God is calling us to make a difference in the world we live in. This calling (or vocation) may be to marriage, parenthood, the single life, nursing, policing... . God has an infinite imagination; there is a unique calling for each one of us. We become disciples when we learn to look at our world through the eyes of Jesus.

This questionnaire will help us to look at our community and discover how it can help each and every one of us become an apprentice of Jesus.

We have heard the facts and figures, the prospect of having 50 priests in our Diocese in 2030, the need for a wider variety of leadership in the Church and the very basic need to become more open to the guidance of the Holy Spirit who is leading us into the future.

Pope Francis gives us clear guidance when he says in *Evangelii Gaudium* (para 20):



"Each Christian and everv community must discern the path that the Lord points out, but all of us are asked to obey his call to go forth from our comfort zone in order to reach all the 'peripheries' in need of the light of the Gospel".

With this call in mind, let us begin to explore the questions before us.

If it is to flourish, a community needs a core of members who are committed to the Gospel of Christ and are willing to make the community a priority, giving generously of their time, imagination, gifts and other resources. A viable parish needs a healthy number of active members.

2 Leadership

It is certain that in the future even more communities will be sharing a priest with other worshipping communities. Priests and deacons will be working more collaboratively with people. The prospect of having around 50 active priests in our Diocese in 15 years' time (2030) certainly sharpens the mind. While we must continue to pray that men will respond to the call of discipleship as ordained priests and deacons, we also need to look carefully at the development of other forms of leadership in the Church.

a) What lay leadership is currently viable and effective in your community?

Our meetings have led to the conclusion that we have a lot of lay leadership in the three churches of our parish. There is a sense that it sometimes feels like the same people are volunteering for things again and again and that it would be lovely if some more new people came forward.

There has always been an active Parish Council and about a year ago it was refreshed and reinvigorated by a new constitution accompanied by a new Parish Vision.

We are blessed with many talented and generous people and lay leadership manifests itself in many areas of our parish life.

Some have been going on for a long time:

Catechism and liturgy for children and young people

Readers Rotas

Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist Rotas

SVP

Music

Finance

We also benefit from leadership in the context of our Joint Management Committee for our shared buildings.

Others are new initiatives:

Communications

Welcoming

Social activity

Bereavement support

We also perceive a need to initiate something new in the area of Adult Formation and that is under discussion at PPC level.

We believe that as a community we can do more to support our Priests and Deacons and we are looking forward to accepting that challenge in the future. A new and more collaborative approach is something that we believe is viable in our parish.

b) For what other areas of your community life could trained lay men and women assume responsibility?

3	Active Involvement of People	

- We think that Adult formation (Faith Development) is an area to explore. Our meetings have identified a strong desire for more to be done in this area and a willingness to get involved.
- Support for Marriage and Care for those in marriage.
- The meetings identified a need to "Market" our church in the local community. This would involve the considerable new housing developments identified above.
- The idea of Lay Pastoral Assistants has been raised. We wonder if it would be possible to train lay people to become Pastoral Assistants but not necessarily at the same level as the people who are currently called Lay Pastoral Assistants. Perhaps we need to identify a more simple programme that would enable lay people to use their talents for the benefit of the church without needing to undertake a long training programme and then commit to too much work. Busy family lives may be need a new approach to be considered.

In parishes where the same small, ageing group of parishioners has served the community extremely well over very many years, there may be some real anxiety about the future. As that small group retires and withdraws from active involvement, the community is at risk of floundering if younger parishioners are unable or unwilling to take their place.

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4 Worship and Spiritual Life

A flourishing community has worship at the centre of its life. The ultimate goal is to make Jesus Christ known and loved. This is why Jesus Christ is at the heart of every worshipping community. The Eucharist is the principal means in which we celebrate this. The Holy Spirit may well be leading us to discover a variety of forms of worship and devotion in the future. For this very reason a living community makes every effort to encourage parishioners of all ages and backgrounds to participate fully in prayer, devotion, worship and study.

God loves us individually. We respond to God's love in our own ways. When we come together for worship we all need to have a sense that our relationship with God is strengthened and affirmed.

At New Hall and St Augustine's we are blessed with a strong contingent of Altar Servers who are well trained by our Deacon and over the years have provided a great model of service to the church and they have always enhanced our liturgy.

Across our three churches we are also blessed with many very good readers, a committed group of excellent Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist,

We have a good music group at St Augustine's.

The experience of regular worship differs across the 3 churches. We recognise a tension between maintaining three worshipping communities in different venues and very different contexts (mass in a private school chapel, an evening vigil mass in the smaller of our communities with no music and a Sunday Mass at St Augustine's with music) combined with the fact that some people prefer to be at one venue or another; and the expressed view that bigger would be better.

7 Finances

A sustainable community must have an annual income that is sufficient to cover its expenses. There needs to be a reliable level of stewardship among the faithful who willingly give of their time, gifts and energy to sustain the work of the community.

a) How do you feel about the average weekly offertory donation in your community? Does this need to increase to enable your community to flourish in 2030?

When we discussed our finances there was a general feeling that we "are doing alright". We are meeting our outgoings and levels of giving have been maintained well despite a significant drop in attendance. However during the meetings it has become apparent that we are likely to face increased costs in the future. Our building at St Augustine is going to need maintenance work that would mean our surpluses in recent years would be more than wiped out. This would be a problem at two levels. Firstly because we would not be able to pay to keep the building in the condition it needs to be in in order to facilitate good regular worship. Secondly because we need the surpluses to repay the loan of nearly £250,000 to the Diocese. As a parish we recognise the responsibility to repay this loan. It was taken out in order to fund the expansion of St Augustine's Church in order to accommodate the many new parishioners expected from the new housing developments. This has not yet come to pass.
b) If you are a finance-rich community, how do you feel about sharing some of your resources with

very poor parts of the Diocese?

8 Facilities

A flourishing community needs good facilities which need to be well maintained. It cannot undertake any building projects, renovations or improvements unless it has the resources to pay for them. 

- having some sort of "commissioning" of young people who have been confirmed. The idea would
 be to make their confirmation the start of their personal ministry and perhaps asking them to
 commit to a theme for a year after their confirmation. This migt be to work with SVP or some
 other catholic charity, to serve on the PPC or to contribute in some particular way to the life of
 their church.
- Encouraging young people and old people and middle aged people to mix more. We all have different gifts and they change during our lives. We need to explore ways of making our church community a community for people of all ages all the time. We discussed using the SVP as a vehicle for this but it is something to explore more widely.
- Rather radically we also discussed the idea that we should ask young people what they want!
- We should find ways to give them the opportunities to witness to their faith in a "No Pressure" sort of way.
- A regular Youth Mass where the young people could do all the organising and all the reading and chose all the music..
- Invite young people personally and individually to offer their gifts.
- Promote Youth Mass at Cathedral and make it possible for our young people to get there.
